About the Tenebrae Service

The service of Tenebrae, or "shadows," is an ancient tradition in the church.

The Scripture readings urge us to re-live the events that led to Jesus' betrayal, arrest, and crucifixion.

The stripping of the Sanctuary's decorations emphasizes the falling away of Jesus' followers, including ourselves.

The diminishing of light represents the power of darkness and evil.

No offering is received, as a sign that nothing we bring secures our salvation; the forgiveness of our sins, and our life itself, are gifts of God's grace alone.

The Strepitus—the slamming of the door at the end of the service—represents the closing of the tomb.

The service ends in darkness and silence. You may leave whenever you wish after the Strepitus. Please observe the vigil of silence until you are outside of the Sanctuary and Narthex.

The Revised Common Lectionary scriptures assigned for today are Isaiah 52:13-53:12, Psalm 22, Hebrews 10:16-25, or Hebrews 4:14-16; 5:7-9 and John 18:1-19:42.

Note on the music:

The music in tonight's service is structured around the words of Psalm 130, "Out of the deep have I called unto thee, O Lord." In his bitter passion and death, Jesus meets us at the very depths of our human experience. These depths are symbolized by the solo cello, which begins the service playing a somber Sarabande by Johann Sebastian Bach. This Sarabande runs directly into the Introit, a haunting setting of the first two verses of Psalm 130 that was written for tonight's service.

The Introit is complimented by John Rutter's setting of Psalm 130 from his *Requiem*. The solo cello and dark harmonies lend this piece an atmosphere both plaintive and yearning, though the music opens a window to a faint glimmer of hope in its setting of the words, "O Israel, trust in the Lord."

The anthem *Solus ad Victimam* by the twentieth-century English composer Kenneth Leighton is tortured, highly dissonant, deeply emotional, and inhabits a sound world that is simultaneously ancient and modern.

The musical reflection *De Profundis* by the French composer Jean Langlais is one of the darkest pieces in the solo organ repertoire. It is based on the chorale tune *Aus tiefer Not*, a paraphrase of Psalm 130 by Martin Luther. The final bars of the piece evoke the breath slowly going out of the lungs of Jesus.
