

#### Note on the music:

Our choral music for this morning's services comes from two larger works, both by British composers, composed nearly 170 years apart: George Frideric Handel's *Messiah* and Ralph Vaughan Williams' *Five Mystical Songs*. Handel (1685-1759) was a successful composer of Italian opera, with performances of forty different operas over his first twenty years in London. By the 1730s, opera had fallen out of favor and was replaced with the oratorio – a combination of dramatic elements from operas, church anthems, and the English language. Many of Handel's oratorios were stories drawn from the Old Testament: *Esther, Israel in Egypt*, and *Judas Maccabeus* (our Hymn of Response, Thine is the Glory, comes from this oratorio, sung to a different text). In 1741, Handel's friend Charles Jennens wrote the text for a new work unlike his other oratorios – *Messiah*. The work's three acts correspond to a period in Jesus' life: the first, his birth, the second, his death and resurrection, and the third, the resurrection of the dead and glory of Christ in Heaven. Unlike in Handel's other oratorios, there are no named characters. *Messiah* saw its premiere in Dublin in April 1742.

Our Benediction Response, the famous "Hallelujah chorus," closes the second act of the oratorio. It is difficult to ignore the triumph of this chorus, most notably through ascending line that heard throughout the chorus on "For the Lord God Omnipotent reigneth." The nearly unstoppable utterances of "Hallelujah" punctuate the movement – Handel often writes them as short notes, almost as though the singers are tripping over themselves in joy to sing them.

The Offertory anthem is the aria for soprano, "I know that my Redeemer liveth." It begins the third and final part of the oratorio and describes Jesus' resurrection and expresses hope for the world to come. The simple setting allows us to focus on the text of the aria and for Handel to subtly demonstrate his text painting (a technique of composing in which the music visually or aurally depicts the text). This is noticeably heard with the ascending melodic line on "for now is Christ risen" – we hear Christ rise from the dead! The aria's tone and music present the Resurrection in a different light: one of simple hope and beauty.

Our other selections are by the British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). Vaughan Williams was raised in a devout Anglican family, who instilled in him strong morals and compassion; this is evident in Vaughan Williams' enlisting in the Royal Army Medical Corps as a medic, despite his advanced age. We sing two songs from the cycle *Five Mystical Songs*, a setting of four poems (the first poem split into two songs) by George Herbert (1593-1633). Herbert was a musician, politician, and Anglican priest, best known today for his metaphysical poetry that sought to define his world through the intertwining of the sacred and profane. *Five Mystical Songs* was composed from 1906-1911 and premiered in September 1911 with a full orchestra. This morning you'll hear a chamber arrangement for string quintet, piano, and trumpets.

Our Introit, "Antiphon," is a bombastic setting of a simple verse and refrain poem that expresses great praise for God. Listen for the refrain "Let all the world in every corner sing, 'My God and King!'" Vaughan Williams follows Herbert's clear formal structure by repeating it throughout the work. Vaughan Williams sets the verses for separate subsections of the choir: the sopranos and tenors, or just the sopranos and altos, creating dizzying variations in a cacophony of praise.

Like Herbert's poetry, Vaughan Williams' setting exudes a deep sense of spirituality, despite Vaughan Williams' own agnosticism. Our Anthem, "Easter," is the first song of the cycle. Herbert's poetry is set mostly for solo baritone; the choir interjects briefly to punctuate the baritone's vocal writing. Listen for the repeating motif around the first line, "Rise heart; thy Lord is risen." Like Handel, Vaughan Williams uses text painting: the piano's ripples when the baritone calls for his lute, or the angular writing in the violins when Herbert describes the "stretched sinews" of Christ on the cross. Herbert's poetry and Vaughan Williams' music invite us into the awe-inspiring mystery of Christ's suffering, death and resurrection. Therefore, like all else this morning, we "sing his praise, without delays."
