# STATEMENT OF FAITH

I believe that many of the specifics of our faith grow and change with us over our lifespan. This is one of the magnificent things about a spiritual life with God, that it journeys and grows with us. There are, however, some central and enduring beliefs that I hold in my life of faith.

I believe in the triune God of grace. God, out of love, molded creation and we see a reflection of God's spirit in all the Earth. God created humankind in God's image and invites us to join with one another and God in caring for the world. However, we are unable to do it alone as imperfect beings. Instead, we use our free will to reach for more and more rather than restore what is. So, we require a savior and teacher. Incapable of sinlessness on our own, we are nevertheless embraced by

God. We are chosen, forgiven, redeemed, and made whole through Jesus, who is God incarnate. He is fully divine and fully human, and came to live and die on this earth, meeting humanity in all our messiness to act as a prophet and messiah. Through Jesus' death and resurrection, we are redeemed and adopted into the family of Christ. By the gift of the Spirit, we continue to grow and be renewed. We find, in the Spirit, an advocate and guide as we seek to mirror the ministry of Jesus and expand God's kingdom of love, mercy, and justice here on earth.

I believe the Church acts as rich soil from which God's restoration grows through worshiping, working, and serving in the example of Jesus. The church is made to bring about and create space for God's kingdom come and to serve as partners in ministry with God. We unite, as a community of believers across all history, in worshiping our loving and gracious Lord through scripture, sacraments, and discipleship. We sharpen and soften one another through our study of the Bible, which is the inspired word of God and our primary source of divine revelation. We journey and support one another to grow in our spiritual lives in discipleship. We celebrate the enduring promises of God to us, and us to each other and God in our sacraments of Baptism and Communion. These are visible signs of God's grace to us, sealing, binding, and feeding us in life and community through Jesus and the Spirit.

Finally, I believe in who we are called to be. We are called to be disciples, meaning, we are called to pay attention and to draw others attention to where and when God shows up. We know that this world could and should be different than it is, so we are called to care for our neighbors, the poor, the orphaned, and the widowed, as the prophet Isaiah says. We are called to practices of inclusion, to contribute to a world where all have voice and respect. We are called to dispel violence and greed, to grow in love, and abandon hate. I believe we are called to seek connection and union across our differences in background, culture, race, gender, socioeconomic status, thought, and theology. God created a diverse world and people, and we encounter God in equally diverse ways, personally and theologically. We are called to be the body of Christ in that deep and joyful complexity. As we journey nearer and nearer to the heart of God, through our individual and communal spiritual practices, I hope it inspires and ignites us to practices of justice, love, and mercy ever more.
